2- Size of Event (This is the only item with really long exposition!)—

Up until 2019 we had larger events. This year we made the choice to limit the size of the event.

We used to cap the number of students at 50 (people taking workshops, that is).

We would have 5 concurrent workshops. We would have up to 8,9 or even 10 instructors. Some for the whole weekend, some just swooping in. We had more guests on site. So that at meal times we might have almost 80 people in the Lodge at long rectangular tables, remember?

This year we ended up with fewer than 30 students, and topped out at 37 people at meal times.

In the end, this year we did not have any "drop in" instructors, so as to limit the number of folks on site.

Since we wanted fewer folks on site, and because the budget would be smaller, I decided to take on more of the instructional load. (There are many years I don't lead any workshops; with the larger group, I'm usually busy putting out fires!) We didn't get to enjoy our friends Carolyn Cruso, Carl Thor, Marina Albero, Simon Chrisman, Hossein Salehi or any other west coast heroes who've pitched in the "before times" larger Rendezvous.

As the pandemic goes endemic and the COVID virus continues to evolve, I hope we can do another 'Vous next year, and suspect it will be another case of "Small is Beautiful."

As the guy doing what might be called "organizing" (you can give me feedback on that job, too!) I enjoyed the smaller size of the group. It gave us more space in the workshops as well as the dining hall. I also enjoyed being small enough to do performances, panels and open mic in Morgan Hall, so we didn't have to be in Lodge and use a PA system to compete with kitchen noise and the sheer size of the group. (And, as a bonus, getting lovely weather on Saturday to use the Picnic Shelter for Karen & Mark's beautiful performance!)

I'll always prefer music presented without amplification — as long as it is in an intimate and acoustically suitable space, it is so much more pleasant and present!
